Report on Haiti

Dear friends and supporters,

It's been a while, but wanted to bring you up to date with news about where your donations have gone.

I have been sending regular payments to the orphanage (via trusted friends going to Haiti) to cover the cost of food, medicine, etc. The latest installment, sent in September, paid for driving lessons for a few of the older children who are leaving the orphanage. With a driver's license, they will at least have a skill that will help them find work. (And believe me, driving in Haiti takes ALOT of skill). Plans are now underway for a \$1.4-million project that will include a dormitory for 100 children and school for 400. (See attached story). The funding is coming from Quebec companies as well as the Jacqueline Lessard Foundation, named after the 84-year-old co-founder of the orphanage. If you want to help more, Jean Coutu stores are accepting donations until Oct. 25.

Your money also paid for a special printer to make identification cards, replacement ink cartridges and a hole punch. Carl-Henry Jean-Baptiste, the young man who worked with me post-earthquake, has set up his own business called Sue-Port Multi Services. (I had nothing to do with the name. Honest). Since so many people lost their identification in the earthquake, Carl, who lives in a camp with his wife and 7year-old son, decided to make it his business to make up photo ID. Business is booming. He also charges for long-distance phone calls on a skype phone, repairs computers and charges cell phone batteries. With time, he hopes to be able to buy a small plot of land and build a secure home. We still have funds in the bank. It seems to me the orphanage now has the backing of some pretty solid funders, so perhaps we can use that money in other ways.

One suggestion I have is to cover at least partial tuition fees for students attending Decamus Business School. This is a school run by the family with whom I lived postearthquake that provides courses in accounting, computers, English and Spanish.

I invite your feedback about this suggestion. And, as always, if anyone has questions or concerns about where the money is going or has gone, please don't hesitate to contact me. The books are open to everyone!

Thank you once again for your continued support and concern for Haiti. While I doubt we'll ever be funding a \$1.4-million project, it's amazing how each of our contributions added up to a significant amount and made a big difference in so many lives.

Everyone we help is very appreciative (Carl-Henry is constantly telling me how we changed his life).

I hope to be going to Haiti next month for the elections, so will be able to report back again then.

Minister's Reflection -Carole's Column

Popular wisdom says you can tell a person's character by the company s/he keeps. James Luther Adams, 20th century Unitarian

theologian, spoke of it in slightly different terms. He talked about "voluntary associations" – how the organizations and causes with which we willingly associate ourselves not only give clues to our identity, but help define us, strongly influencing who we are and what we become.

When it comes to social action, I like to think that we "befriend" certain issues and causes out of who we are, and who we wish to become. This is nowhere more evident than in our Sunday morning services and program themes. Now that we have begun to advertise more widely these days, not just in our newsletter to our membership and in the local news, but also on our newly expanding website and with posters at strategic venues in surrounding villages, wherever we as members live and move and as the sacred saying goes, have our being.

From the diverse Sunday speakers and topics presented in past months, imagine what a visitor or newcomer might learn about UU Estrie, Unitarian Universalism, and who we are, what we stand for. I recommend we all try on that "visitor" hat every now and then, to more easily gauge whether the identity we project is how we wish to be known. In looking back over the past year, I can proudly affirm that we do what any responsible religious community of the 21st century would do, who see ourselves as members of the global community.

What issues and causes, far and near, do we befriend? Our sense of being part of a global community and our consistent interest in events beyond North Hatley is evident in our Sunday themes. In lieu of a social action committee, our Programme Committee brings before us so many diverse issues and concerns, that for me it appears that a huge part of our social action,

beyond what we as individuals or a church agree to promote or fund, is witness and education. For ourselves and the larger community. We witness to ethical, economic and humanitarian concerns as far away as Pakistan (the building of schools), Africa (the HIV/Aids pandemic), South America (the plight of Amerind villages). We educate ourselves about mental illness and hear about the Koran first hand, from a practicing Muslim. We bring the world into our midst and by our openness to the lives and ideas of ohers, we acknowledge that we are, indeed, part of a "network of mutuality" — to quote reading #584 in our hymnal, words of Martin Luther King.

Our Welcome Statement includes people of all diversities, and our programming reflects the same openness to a wide range of ideas and world views. Visitors to our church might be drawn to us by a certain topic and vet wonder about the spiritual message behind the topic. Sometimes we ourselves might wonder. We may not always be in agreement with the speaker; we may struggle to accept or understand. Perhaps at times we experience radical conflict between our own and the beliefs or world views expressed by the presenter. Our morning worship may raise new questions, or provide rew answers. Yet always, the mere fact that we as a religious community have chosen to invite "the other" into our sanctuary, to give them a voice in the context of our worship service, is integral to the spiritual message - a sign that we are committed to living out our vision of an inclusive faith. Our first principle is, above all, "to honour the inherent worth and dignity of every person." Thus do we live our message, and by our "voluntary associations" stand by our principles.

Flood relief for Pakistan

Since the world learned of the floods now devastating Pakistan, conditions have worsened dramatically. As of August 23, the Pakistani government estimates that 17.2 million people are affected by the floods — more than the Haiti earthquake, the 2005 South Asia earthquake, and the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami combined.

The growing enormity of this humanitarian disaster has compelled UUSC and the Unitarian Universalist Association to launch our UUSC-UUA Joint Pakistan Flood Relief Fund.

Most recently, rivers flowing from the flooded areas in the northwest have swelled with water and are deluging the Sindh and Punjab provinces in the south. This is sure to have serious long-term implications for all of Pakistan. The fertile Punjab is the breadbasket for a country where a third of its population of 170 million people live below the poverty line.
