Response to the proposed Charte des valeurs québecoises

Rev. Diane Rollert, minister of the Montreal Unitarian congregation, writes in part:

"Seeing the trial proposal for a *Charte des valeurs québécoises* is heartbreaking for me as an immigrant and as a religious person. It signals to me that I may never be fully welcome in my chosen home. It tells me that people "like me" are something to be feared, a message that is so different from the warmth and welcome I have personally encountered.

"In my time here, I have met an incredible diversity of people, and my life has been especially enriched by some of the people who would be most affected by this charter."

Minister's Reflection -Carole's Column

Having a vision is like throwing a dream into the future, then catching up with it and living into it until it becomes real. If the visioning process had a theme song, it would probably be the soul-

searching chant - based on the three existential questions of the artist Gauguin - which appears in our hymnal: *Where do we come from, who are we, where are we going?*

A visioning process is not just pie in the sky or navel-gazing. A well-known proverb poses it as a life or death issue: "Without a vision, the people will perish." What's true of individuals is true of any organization or community. In order to move forward, it helps to know where we are going. Or as one pundit wisely suggests: If you don't know where you're going, you'll probably end up there. Not necessarily in a place of your choosing!

So from time to time, our church leadership has stepped aside from the business of programming, fundraising, building maintenance and numerous meetings, to take stock of our situation. Expanding on the basic questions: What is our history? Who are we now? What is our context? What opportunities exist now that we might explore? What social justice issues are most urgent today? How shall we use our precious resources? Where should we focus our energies? What is our hope for the future? Considering that all things change over time, what or who do we wish to become? What would it take to do ______.(fill in the blank)?

These are questions members of your Board, Committee on Ministry, and minister are exploring through a series of meetings, begun this summer and continuing into the fall, to formulate new priorities for our shared ministry. Our version of a "strategic plan" or long-range vision. We start with a few things we know about ourselves: Many of us are moving into the "golden age" where our increased wisdom seems to be matched by an ever-decreasing physical energies. Pastoral care is an important part of our present and our future. Our historic building is also showing its age, and in need of

continual maintenance. Hidden away in this lovely but small resort village in the Townships, the limited demographics of our location pose challenges to growth. We are increasingly becoming an island of English-speaking Quebecers in a francophone sea. We are surrounded by churches of other faiths who are also struggling to maintain their existence. We long to make a difference in our world, locally and globally.

Recently, we've written proposals on your behalf and been awarded grants for two specific outreach initiatives. One from the New York Universalists is funding translation of our website by a qualified intern recommended to us by a francophone member. This has prompted us to look more closely at the presentation we make of ourselves on the web, editing existing texts and adding new ones. A second grant from the Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) Sharing Our Faith fund was awarded last May to help fund outreach and networking in the community. Our presence at the local Townshippers Day held this year on Saturday, 12 September at the Bishop's College School campus in Lennoxville is part of that effort. We'll be promoting our uniquely noncreedal Sunday morning option on the Quebec religious landscape for those who do not yet know we exist - just one of many ways to make ourselves known. You can think of others, I'm sure. Elsewhere in this newsletter, your Board President Sooky Dunton has outlined some of the major considerations in this covenanting process that we hope will move toward a more dynamic and focused shared ministry. She is asking for your input. What are your fondest dreams and hopes for this unique religious community we are creating together?

Renewal rarely happens by accident. Eventually, what does not remain relevant becomes obsolete. We need all voices so we can move forward together. Please call or write your suggestions, and email them or place them in the wooden box outside the church office. We'll keep you posted! And as always - see you in church!

Our meetings to date have been the aforementioned ones on covenance, on the Caring Committee and on a post mortem of our fund raising.
