Minister's Reflection - Carole's Column

"All beautiful the march of day as seasons come and qo..."

Thus begins one of my favourite songs praising nature in our grey hymnal. March means many things, but one of them is that it

harbors the beginning the Spring Equinox. While winter is still visible, the earth is shifting toward warmth, the days are increasing incrementally, with earlier sunrises and later sunsets. Seed catalogs appear among the bills in the post, and a recent visit to the Sawyerville Seed Festival has put a spring in my spirit. I now have various seeds sprouting in a sunny window - lavender, tomato, bean and purple garlic - and the growing season will be upon us before we can drag out the garden tools from the shed.

March is Women's History Month, and I think of all the women's marches recently, the amazing power of people gathered in peaceful solidarity celebrating common cause, demanding basic human rights and justice.

March is also marked this year for me by our monthly worship theme of simplicity. In prep for my "sermon of the month", I've been thinking of the many ways simplicity might feature in our lives. Not just our attitude toward material possessions, but how we approach all aspects of our lives. A simplified living space invites reflection and clarity of mind. A simple approach to spirituality is to love honestly what our heart loves. Simplicity of heart makes for a lack of guile and deceit. Simple truths are usually those that ring truest.

I've begun rereading an old favourite by psychologist Erich Fromm entitled To Have or To Be. Fromm says we waste psychic energy amassing objects and investing them with some sense of security. While all our lives, our simple task as humans on this earth is, quite simply, to BE. And since April's worship theme is resistance, I'm straddling two months and embracing a simple form of resistance to all the craziness that seems to dominate the public discourse. I vow simply to resist being robbed

of my joy that Spring is coming, and life will -because or inspite of us - renew itself as it always does.

President's Ponderings on Pipes

Back in the early 80's, the UU Church of North Hatley opened for services in April around Easter and closed in November. It was too expensive to heat during the cold weather.

Closing the building included draining the water from the pipes to the kitchen sink and probably the cellar washroom. Once a month, the congregation would meet for a pot luck supper and organized program at the Community Hall, above the fire station.

In those days, the door to the present closet in Avery Booth Hall, opened to a set of rickety, steep stairs that ended in a dirt floor cellar. A small bathroom was dug out of the cellar and a toilet and sink had been installed down there. It was a constant battle to keep the spiders from taking over the space. I tried to avoid using the facilities as much as possible.

Nowadays, we have only to move downstairs for our cold weather programs. We meet weekly instead of monthly and have access to a restroom on each level. But we still turn off the water to the upstairs which gets very cold. A few disasters took place in the past when for some reason or other, those responsible were caught unprepared. Burst water pipes and flooding are a super drag at ant time but have to be dealt with as quickly as possible.

This past December 18th, after our Christmas Carole service and everyone had left, Keith and I were doing a few last minute jobs, like turning off the water in the upstairs washroom. We had already experienced some frigid temperatures; close to -30 C at night, which could easily have been disastrous. On that freezing, cold night, Keith valiantly drove out to UUEstrie after midnight, when I first thought to worry about the water freezing in the pipes, and he turned on the heat in the upstairs washroom.

The water had already been turned off in the upstairs kitchen. For some reason, on that December 18th evening, I went into the kitchen and discovered that the drain in the kitchen sink was full of ice and frozen solid. Uuh-ooh! I turned the heat on in the kitchen and said a little prayer and hoped everything would be alright.

Someone, not being aware of the situation had apparently poured water down the drain! Luckily with the heater on and milder temperatures outdoors, the drain thawed and cleared. Phew!
